Myxomatosis



Myxomatosis is a devastating disease of rabbits. In its natural host, the South American rabbit, the poxvirus causes a relatively mild disease. However the European rabbit is much more severely affected and usually dies. The virus has been deliberately introduced into wild populations of rabbits as a method of controlling numbers.

Smallpox

Smallpox first appeared in the Far East over 2000 years ago and is one of the most devastating diseases known to man. After successful vaccination campaigns throughout the 19th and 20th centuries, in 1980, the World Health Organisation confirmed that smallpox had been eradicated.



Orf



Orf causes scabby lesions on the lips and nostrils of sheep and goats throughout the world but humans can also become infected, resulting in painful swollen red ulcers.
